The Main Street Arts Council received a grant from the Dane G. Hansen Foundation, Logan, in the amount of \$29,500.00 last June, which assisted in the purchase of portable sound and lighting equipment used during the 2021 Main Street Summer Theater Festival.

Due to supply chain issues caused by the pandemic, the sound equipment arrived after performances had begun for the 2021 festival, however, the arts council was able to use it for the Hoxie performance, supplementing the Hoxie High School Auditorium's new sound equipment recently replaced by the school district in the spring of 2021. The Arts Council was also able to use the sound equipment, which includes 15 body microphones, one hand-held microphone and the necessary speakers, for the performances in Colby and Atwood, respectively, which allowed for the outdoor audiences to enjoy and "hear" the youth actors.

"We are so grateful to the Hansen Foundation for their support of our organization and funding for the new equipment," said MSAC Executive Director Karl Pratt. "With the ongoing pandemic, we felt last summer was a perfect opportunity to experiment with outdoor theater. Having the new sound equipment made that possible and ensured our actors would be heard and enjoyed by our audience members."


Unfortunately, the lighting equipment, which includes energy efficient LED fixtures, did not arrive until December 2021; however, the Arts Council looks forward to utilizing all the equipment for the 2022 Main Street Summer Theater festival, which will once again include performances in Atwood, Colby, Goodland, Hoxie and Quinter.

The Arts Council is currently fundraising for this year's festival and will post auditions and show information to their website at www.mainstreetartscouncil.com/msstf2022 very soon.

Once the Arts Council has had an opportunity to fully master the operation of all equipment, it hopes to make it available for use by area schools and other organizations for concerts and performances as scheduling allows.

Missouri and Kansas Statewide Severe Weather Tornado Drin

On Tuesday, March 8, 2022, at 10:00 AM State Emergency Management and the NWS will conduct a Statewide Severe Weather Tornado Drill.

Every school, citizen, and business is encouraged to participate in the drill.

Residents should treat the drill as if it were an actual Tornado Warning. The purpose of the drill is to test everyone's readiness for life-threatening severe weather events such as tornadoes, flash floods, and damaging winds. Local officials are encouraged to sound warning sirens to initiate the drill.

The National Weather Service will issue a Routine Weekly Test (RWT) to NOAA Weather Radios to initiate the drill. In Missouri, this is a change from past years in which a true Tornado Warning was issued.

The NWS encourages everyone to abide by health and safety guidelines, including social distancing and wearing a mask per local directives. If that's not possible during the tornado test, then consider participating by simply sheltering-in-place or discussing sheltering options/plans among co-workers/family members.

The purpose of the drill is to test everyone's readiness for lifethreatening severe weather events such as tornadoes, flash floods, and damaging winds. Local officials may sound warning sirens to initiate the drill. https://bit.ly/3IHClyI

What I Saw at the Border and Why it Matters

America faces a crisis at our southwest border.

During 2021, authorities encountered about two million migrants at the border, up from fewer than 550,000 the year before, not counting those who eluded detection. That wave of humanity has overwhelmed border security, and that's a problem for Kansas.

Last month, I traveled to Texas to meet with Governor Greg Abbott and other Texas officials to see the border crisis myself. During a twoday summit with other state attorneys general, we saw:

• The unfinished border wall, riddled with incomplete segments shockingly easy to walk through and around.



Taxpayers have bought steel to build more, but it sits rusting in piles because the Biden administration will neither install it nor allow Texas to.

Front-line federal agents just trying to do their jobs. Unfortunately, our interaction with federal agents was limited because the evening before our arrival, their superiors in Washington abruptly canceled our briefings without explanation.

Dedicated Texas officers enforcing state laws near the unsecured border. They know the reality on the ground. They showed us which houses and other structures on the Mexican side are owned and used by the cartels and explained how cartels pay spotters - often children - to sit along the Rio Grande and report the location of patrol boats so smugglers know when the coast is

In our proud nation of immigrants, emotional immigration politics too often obscure this tragic truth: There are more crime victims in Kansas today because the federal government is failing on border security.

During my time as attorney general, our office successfully prosecuted an illegal alien in Southeast Kansas who shot an Oklahoma police officer, kidnapped a Kansas motorist, invaded a Kansas residence, and attempted to murder a Kansas officer. In North Central Kansas, we prosecuted an illegal alien for sex crimes against a young child. And we prosecuted an illegal alien in Southwest Kansas for murder.

After the Kansas Supreme Court incorrectly ruled that federal law shielded certain illegal aliens from state identity theft laws, we appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court. I argued that case myself, and we won.

These crimes are among many committed in Kansas by people here illegally. Much violent crime here is connected to the smuggling of drugs and people across the border. Deported criminals too often easily return to Kansas and commit new crimes. The Kansas Department of Corrections recently reported 246 inmates in Kansas prisons are subject to possible deportation upon release; county jails and federal prisons hold more.

Weak federal policy invites border chaos, and drug cartels and other criminal organizations use that chaos as cover to extend their operations in the United States, including Kansas. A bad situation has grown worse in the past year.

That's why I've sued the Biden administration to do its job, such as reinstating the Trump administration's "Remain in Mexico" Migrant Protection Protocols. But the Biden administration has responded weakly even after a court order. Ultimately, we need new leadership to prioritize border security.

Until that day comes, our best available option is to cooperate with requests trom Texas tor assistance. We should help Texas identify, intercept and stop trans-border violence and criminal activity before it reaches Kansas because Texas still stands between us and the border. Our families and communities will be







Annual Severe Weather Preparedness Week Set for March 7-11

Spring is coming and with it will be severe weather thunderstorms, high winds, floods, and tornadoes.

To remind Kansans to prepare for the coming severe weather season, Gov. Laura Kelly has issued a proclamation designating March 7-11 as Severe Weather Preparedness Week in Kansas.

"Preparedness is the best defense against the severe springtime weather we typically have in Kansas," Kelly said. "Last year, there were no deaths attributed to tornadoes in the state, thanks in part to our early warning systems and the preparedness measures taken by Kansans across the state."

Kelly also credited the cooperative information and education efforts of the Kansas Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service, county emergency management agencies, and media partners.

"We have a great working relationship with other state agencies, private organizations and news outlets," said Angee Morgan, Deputy Director of the Kansas Division of Emergency Management. "KDEM is committed to keeping Kansans safe and we could not do it without the help of all these partners."

As part of the week's activities, Kansans are urged to take part in the statewide tornado safety drill 10 a.m. Tuesday, March 8. This year, to avoid any confusion to the public, a live tornado warning will not be sent out on the NOAA Weather Radio. Instead, there will be a Routine Weekly Test message asking people to practice sheltering.

"We are asking county emergency managers to sound their outdoor warning sirens as part of the drill," said Morgan, "and ask for their help to publicize this drill ahead of time and on the actual test date. We also encourage all Kansans to use this week to make sure their home emergency kits are stocked with up-to-date supplies and to review their home emergency plans."

Herbert W. Clutter was a farmer from Holcomb and the first president of the National Association of Wheat Growers, which was established in 1948. Clutter encouraged Kansas wheat farmers to organize as a strong, unified voice, which led to the formation of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers in 1952. He encouraged research in education and industrial uses of wheat, improved variety development and methods to produce the best product at the lowest cost. Clutter's efforts led to the formation of the Kansas Wheat Commission by the Kansas legislature in 1957.

"Herb Clutter's leadership in the wheat industry and passion for his community continues to serve as an excellent example for young men and women in agriculture," Gilpin said. "With the continued support of his family, this scholarship helps identify and support future leaders of the wheat industry."

The scholarship fund will award one \$1,000 scholarship per year to a college or university-bound incoming freshman from Kansas pursuing a career in the field of agriculture. To be eligible for the scholarship, applicants must plan to be a full-time student at any two- or four-year Kansas college or university. Recipients will be selected based on academic achievement, leadership qualities and career objectives focused on the field of agriculture. The scholarship will be toward tuition for the student's college or university education. The scholarship is non-renewable.

AG Derek Schmidt Introduces Legislation to Prohibit 'Sanctuary Cities' in Kansas

The Kansas House of Representatives has introduced legislation at the request of Attorney General Derek Schmidt to prohibit socalled "sanctuary cities" in Kansas.

Schmidt earlier this month said that he would seek legislation after the Unified Government of Kansas City/Wyandotte County adopted a local ordinance to restrict its police department's ability to cooperate with federal immigration authorities and to authorize issuance of municipal identification cards, including to individuals not lawfully present in the United States. Schmidt said at the time that he was unsure current state law prohibits those local actions but that the Legislature should enact a state statute to prevent a patchwork of local approaches to immigration enforcement from developing around the state. Municipalities that adopt these sorts of local restrictions on cooperating with immigration authorities commonly are called "sanctuary" jurisdictions.

"Citizens throughout our state deserve to know that wherever they may travel in Kansas, law enforcement officials are cooperating with federal and state agencies to fairly enforce applicable law and are not obliged to turn a blind eye to some unlawful conduct merely because of local politics," Schmidt said. "Particularly in light of the current federal administration's ongoing failure to secure our nation's southwest border, this is an important law-and-order issue throughout our state, not merely a matter for local preference."

The proposed legislation, House Bill 2717, focuses on preventing local political interference with law enforcement cooperation in immigration enforcement and is modeled on a similar law enacted in Indiana in 2011, when it was signed into law in that state by then-Gov. Mitch Daniels. The legislation would:

Prohibit municipalities from preventing law enforcement agencies from sharing information or cooperating with immigration authorities.

Prohibit municipalities from limiting or restricting the enforcement of federal immigration law within their jurisdiction. Require law enforcement agencies to notify their officers that they have a duty to cooperate with state and federal agencies and officials in the enforcement of immigration law.

The proposed legislation also addresses the authority of cities or counties to issue their own municipal identification cards by requiring that any municipal identification cards may not be used to satisfy any identification requirement established by state law and must bear the words "Not valid for state ID." It also would amend existing state law to make fraudulent use of a municipal identification card a crime just as fraudulent use of a state identification card currently is a crime.



Hoxie Boys Wrestling Wins Regional Tournament, Send 10 to State

The Hoxie wrestling team sent eight wrestlers into the finals Saturday night at the KSHSAA 321A Regional C Tournament. By tournament end, Hoxie had earned 22 falls, one major decision and seven decision wins, securing the regional team title by a margin of 84.5 points over second place Hill City. Individually, the Indian wrestlers claimed four champion, four runner-up and two fourth place medals.

Individual regional champions for Hoxie are Drew Bell (138 pound), Drew Bretz (152 pound), Derek Johnson (160 pound), and Sam Watkins (170 pound). Runner-ups are Tate Weimer (113 pound), Wayne Shepard (120 pound), Carson Ochs (126 pound) and Dayton Bell (132 pound). Kash Shiltz (106 pound) and Duncan Bell (145 pound) punched their state tickets with fourth place finishes. Senior Donovan Balluch (195 pound) went 1-2 at the regional tournament, finishing his season with a 25-14 record but did not qualify for the state tournament.


With this regional tournament win, the Indians capped off another perfect pre-state season. Having not suffered a team loss since their second-place finish at the 2020 KSHSAA 321A State Tournament the wrestlers are heading into this year's state tournament as the undefeated number one ranked team. Taking 10 wrestlers to the state tournament, eight of whom are ranked, the Indians are prepared to defend and ready to repeat. Hoxie will now turn their attention to the KSHSAA 321A State Championships this Friday and Saturday at Gross Memorial Coliseum in Hays.

Hungry for two titles, they will battle to bring home individual titles and another team title. Number one ranked wrestlers competing for Hoxie are 126-pound Carson Ochs (33-4), 138-pound Drew Bell (36-1), 152-pound Drew Bretz (38-2), 160-pound Derek Johnson (36-1), and 170-pound Sam Watkins (37-3). Coming in at the number two ranked positions are 113-pound Tate Weimer (33-7) and 132-pound Dayton Bell (30-9). Wayne Shepard (26-13) holds the sixth-place ranking at 120 pounds. Unranked, Kash Schiltz (19-20) and Duncan Bell (32-10) will be competing in the 106- and 145-pound weight classes.



A Secret Surprise




The undefeated Hoxie Wrestling team capped off their perfect season last Saturday with a final win at the KSHSAA 3-2-1 A State Tournament in Hays. Earning 186.0 team points the wrestlers set a new state record for the largest points margin win over the runner-up team. A record made a little sweeter with every Indian wrestler contributing by scoring team points at the tournament. Additionally, the team had several other number one tournament accolades. The team was first for most pins/technical falls in the least amount of time (20 in 50:45), the most match points scored (237), most technical falls in the least amount of time (6 in 22:03) and most pins in the least amount of time (14 in 28:42.) With police and fire escort the returning team was welcomed back to a cheering fan lined Main Street under a fireworks display.


This year has been another exceptional year for the Indians. Remaining undefeated for the second full year the Indian wrestlers dominated every dual and tournament where they competed. This year's state team was led by returning two-time State Champion Drew Bell and was comprised of six other returning state placers and three freshmen. Their domination as a team continued in full force from the moment they took the mat at last weekend's state tournament. By the conclusion of Friday's rounds Hoxie had amassed 157.0 team points and was sending six wrestlers into the finals. By tournaments end Hoxie had three individual champions, Tate Weimer (113 lb), Drew Bell (138 lb) and Derek Johnson (160 lb.) Carson Ochs (120 lb), Dayton Bell (132 lb) and Sam Watkins (170 lb) brought home runner-up medals and Drew Bretz (152lb) placed third

Senior Drew Bell (138 lb) had the most pins in the least amount of time for the tournament. With four pins Drew won has third individual state title while spending only 2 minutes and 16 seconds on the mat. Junior Derek Johnson (170 lb) also won his third individual state title when he defeated Hill City's Aiden Amrein in the finals. Junior Wayne Shepard (120 lb) did not place but had the fastest technical fall of the tournament at 2 minutes and 17 seconds.

Hoxie's varsity team will lose two graduating seniors this year, Drew Bell and Donovan Balluch, but with nine returning state qualifiers, seven of which are past state placers, and new incoming talent, the Indian wrestling program will continue to dominate and well return to the mat next season looking to bring home a third State Team Title.










Marissa Porsch Makes History







Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending February 27, 2022, topsoil moisture supplies rated 48% very short, 32% short, 20% adequate, and 0% surplus, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 39% very short, 38% short, 23% adequate, and 0% surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat condition rated 11% very poor, 27% poor, 37% fair, 24% good, and 1% excellent.

Kansas Milk Production

Milk production in Kansas during January 2022 totaled 347 million pounds, down 3% from January 2021, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. The average number of milk cows was 169,000 head, 5,000 head less than January 2021. Milk production per cow averaged 2,055 pounds.

USDA Extends Deadline for Spot Market Hog Pandemic Program

Hog producers who sold hogs through a spot market sale during the COVID-19 pandemic now have until April 15 to submit their applications for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Spot Market Hog Pandemic Program (SMHPP). SMHPP, which is part of USDA's Pandemic Assistance for Producers initiative, originally had a deadline to submit applications by February 25.

Eligible hog producers can apply for SMHPP by completing the FSA-940, Spot Market Hog Pandemic Program application. Visit farmers.gov/smhpp to learn more.




County-level row crop estimates are not published if any of the following conditions exist:

KDA Announces Specialty Crop Grant Opportunity

The Kansas Department of Agriculture (KDA) is accepting applications for the 2022 Specialty Crop Block Grant Program. Funds for the program are awarded to the agency by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service.

The grant funds are in turn granted to projects and organizations to enhance the competitiveness of specialty crops by leveraging efforts to market and promote specialty crops; assisting producers with research and development relevant to specialty crops; expanding availability and access to specialty crops; and addressing local, regional, and national challenges confronting specialty crop producers. Specialty crops are defined by the USDA as "fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, dried fruits, horticulture, and nursery crops, including floriculture."

Applications will be evaluated by a team of external reviewers. The team will rate proposals on their ability to successfully promote specialty crops in Kansas and make a positive impact on the Kansas economy. Those recommendations will be submitted to the Kansas Secretary of Agriculture, who will make the final

ABC's of the Farm Bill

Here we are approaching mid-March and Farm Bill election deadline again. We have lived through some volatile times this past year, with more on the horizon it seems. With all that uncertainty, it might be wise to review your program elections and ensure your base acres are in your desired program by the sign-up deadline of March 15th. The Farm Bill program election is done on a yearly basis now, in contrast to the last Farm Bill where we made only one selection that lasted the whole life of the Bill. So, if the government has given us the option to reassess each year and make a change when we think it is warranted, why not?

To refresh our memory, let's go through the Farm Bill options again. We have 3 available programs:

Price Loss Coverage or PLC: PLC is a program similar to the old payment programs where we look at price alone. Payments are made when the national Marketing Year Average price (MYA) drops below the effective reference price set by legislation. Reference prices for our major crops are:

Corn: \$3.70

Wheat: \$5.50 Soybeans: \$8.40

Grain Sorghum: \$3.95

Anytime the MYA drops below those prices, a payment is made. The payment is equivalent to the difference between the MYA and the reference price multiplied by your farm's established program yield then multiplied by 85% of your base acres of that commodity.

It's important to note that the MYA is not our local cash price. It's an average seen throughout the marketing year for that particular commodity at a national level. You can see estimates for MYA prices from K-State, the USDA, and other resources at our K-State Agricultural Economics website, AgManager.info.

In addition, if you elect PLC, you will have two supplementary margin protection options available for purchase through your regular crop insurance provider if you are interested.

Agricultural Risk Coverage - County level or ARC-CO: This ogram is revenue-based, and payments are dependent on your county-level yield and the national MYA price. So, when does ARC-CO pay out? ARC-CO pays when county level revenue falls below the county guarantee. The county guarantee is 86% of the county benchmark, calculated by multiplying a 5-year Olympic average of MYA price and a 5-year Olympic average county yield. Anytime the county revenue falls below that guarantee number, you'll see a payment based on the difference in those numbers multiplied by 85% of your base acres. Now, one item to note, ARC-CO payments do max out at just 10% of the county benchmark.

If you are enrolled in an ARC program, you have the opportunity to purchase one supplementary margin protection option through your regular crop insurance provider. Your crop insurance agent can provide more information on those programs and costs.

Agricultural Risk Coverage - Individual or ARC-IC: Again, this program is revenue-based like ARC-CO. However, it differs from ARC-CO as payments are dependent on your individual yield, not the county yield, and the national MYA price. One key thing to remember for ARC-IC is that this program pays out on only 65% of your base acres. This program had very little use in Kansas, but if you would like to explore the option, check out AgManager.info for more details.

Now that we have the programs straightened out, let's chat about this year's decision. The decision laid before us in March of this year is for the crops we harvest in 2022. Now, the marketing year for the crops used to calculate prices doesn't begin until June for wheat or September for corn, sorghum, and soybeans. This means the decision we make now won't see potential payments

As we think about the decision for our staple crops here in Northwest Kansas, we can see it's not as straight-forward as it seemed in other years. What do you see happening to crop prices or yields in the coming year? Remember, we're concerned about prices starting in either June or September of this year for our current decision. Are you worried about market volatility? Do you want to protect against a dramatic downward price slide? If so, $\ensuremath{\mathsf{PLC}}$ might be worth your consideration for certain commodities.

On the flip side, do you see PLC as too far out of the money? Those reference prices are far below what we are seeing right now in many crops. Or are you concerned about our current drought and potential lower yields this summer and fall? If so, ARC programs, based on revenue, might be worth your consideration.

K-State Research and Extension has a number of tools available to help provide additional information as you make your program election decisions. These tools are available for you to utilize at home on our K-State Agricultural Economics website, AgManager. info, or in our office with an Extension Agent. 
Jan, a resident of Hoisington recently moving from Great Bend, was a longtime area hairdresser and



Commission Minutes 2/22/22

Now on this 22nd day of February 2022, the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Wes Bainter presiding. Others present were Mike "Buck" Mader, Joe Bainter, County Attorney Joe Pratt, and County Clerk Heather Bracht. Guest was Carolyn Meyer.

At 8:00 a.m. Wes Bainter called the meeting to order.

Those in attendance stood and recited the Pledge of

Joe Herskowitz, Road & Bridge Supervisor, came to the table. Herskowitz stated he had completed the paperwork for the High-Risk Rural Roads Safety Plan and should be submitted this week. There are a lot of signs that need replaced due to reflectivity. The Local Road Safety Plan will cover reflective signs, so once both plans have been approved, reflective signs will be replaced.

Road & Bridge employees should start sloping the banks at the bridge at 20E this week.

Herskowitz is getting quotes for the striping on the feedlot road. There will be white lines on the shoulder and dotted yellow line to the shop then solid yellow lines. They still need to put the guardrails up on the bridge, the County has the materials.

Sand has been hauled this week to several areas.

Jeff Stewart, District Engineer with KDOT advised Herskowitz they are looking at putting a gravel shoefly on Hwy 23 S when they start construction on Hwy 23. The co-op has concerns on the bridge and timeline of the work. KDOT has the full support of the commissioners as it pertains to the work on Hwy 23. They feel the County has waited a long time for the work to be done and the inconvenience is only for a short period of time.

Herskowitz stated the grader that had the transmission rebuilt is having the same issues. Herskowitz said they have only put about 24 hours on it since it was last repaired. Board agreed to get the grader back to Vic Winter or see if he can come here and see what the issue is.

There was discussion on the bucket truck.

Herskowitz will get prices for an independent tree company to remove trees before a decision is made on whether to fix or not. The State will come out and look over where the tire area will be at the landfill. Once reviewed, the permit will be approved, and the County will go from there. The State cautioned about having too many tires and the standing

water/mosquito issue that can come.

Herskowitz stated he did get the household hazardous waste trailer reserved for the City of Hoxie cleanup.

Wes Bainter contacted Better Built Trailers about the two recycling trailers and Mike Bainter stated they don't have them yet.

Mindy Harting, Appraiser, came to the table. Harting distributed the 2021 and 2022 Abstract of Appraised and Assessed Values documentation. Harting stated the assessed value has gone down for 2022. Harting stated she had received a recall notice on the pickup used by her office. Oakley can take care of it, and they will call when they are ready.

Joe Pratt is still having discussion with Britton Sealock regarding the purchase of the lot.

Brandon Carver, Sheriff, Dawn Gabel, and Jennifer Hecker from Options came to the table. Information was distributed about Options and the services provided with information specific to Sheridan County. They stated that due to COVID they are operating at 25% capacity, so the overflow stays in hotels. There was discussion about where their funding comes from, how the hotline is manned, shelters, and current needs. The Board thanked them for coming.

Mike O'Dell, CFO, Chad Koster, CEO and Rebecca Bird from the Sheridan County Health Complex and Shirley Niermeier, Sheridan County Treasurer, came to the table.


There was discussion about Public Health and the disconnect there seems to be about what is happening there. It was decided that Public Health would obtain their own Post Office box and that any grants received would start going direct to Public Health and not deposited in the Public Health Fund with the County. This is effective immediately. Niermeier will transfer the tax distribution for Public Health directly to the hospital through the automatic payment system.

There was discussion about the building for Public Health and who is going to determine the square feet needed for the facility and whether the County would go on the hospital bond as far as paying the portion required for Public Health or pay for it directly. Koster stated the projected start date is July 1, 2022. He will bring back the recommendation as far as square footage once the architecture has completed the plans.

O'Dell stated that a LTC nurse has agreed to do parttime (short term) as the Public Health nurse. O'Dell stated they would reach out






