Property Division. Currently, there is more than \$350 million in unclaimed assets held by the State Treasurer's Office. This money comes from forgotten bank accounts, stocks, bonds, insurance premium overpayments, refunds, abandoned safe deposit boxes and other property.

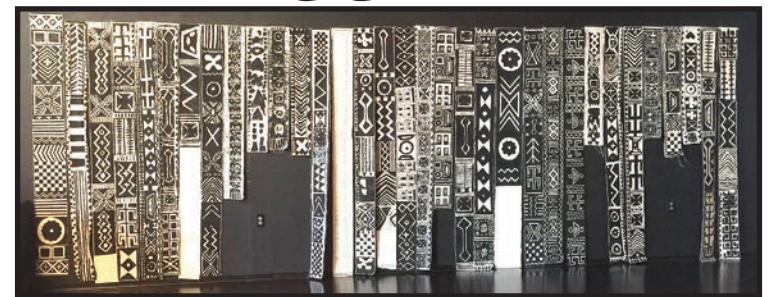

Cross and Flame UMC Plans A Year of Activity

Well, it's that time of year again. I can hear the squeaking of the swings at the school, and the squealing of children playing on the playground from my office at the United Methodist Church. School is back in session; the busy time of harvest, and camps, and finding something to do with the kids all day is winding down. We are getting ready to enjoy that oh so comforting schedule after our hectic summers. As we are all looking forward to a new year of school, and a new season of our lives, the Hoxie United Methodist Church is preparing for an impactful season of community enrichment. We have several events and strategies to reach out to as many people as possible this year, and it all starts with our Big Splash event on August 30.

The Big Splash is our way of kicking off another year of our Connect on Wednesday's for the people of Sheridan County. We will start at 6:00 p.m. here at the Methodist Church with a meal and fellowship, followed by some games for the kids out in the yard. We will have something for everyone that night, people of all ages can enjoy the evening as we play water kickball, and toss around some water balloons. If you are a kid, or know some kids that are in Kindergarten through 12th grade, feel free to come to the church, have some fun, and make sure you wear some clothes you don't mind getting wet! If getting wet is something you'd rather leave to the youth, there will be plenty of things for adults to do as well, including a Bible Study that evening geared for adults, as well as coffee,

food, and fantastic fellowship! Everyone is invited.

Like I said, the Big Splash event kicks off our year of "Connect on Wednesday's," which is a family-oriented weekly event. It starts on September 6, at 6:00 in the evening with a buffet style meal open to everyone in the community. We spend thirty minutes eating and fellowshiping before we are dismissed into our classes. We have four classes to accommodate every age group from kindergarten all the way through adulthood. If you're a family with kids, and want a place to make lasting friendships, study the truth of God's word, and want your kids to have the same opportunity, then this is the place for you! The classes last about 45 minutes, and for the kids usually involve games, learning, prayer, and community involvement. At 7:15 everyone is released from their classes and invited to meet in the sanctuary for a contemporary worship service that is centered around praise, and a quick, and practical, object lesson based in God's word. This service is called "FOUNDry" and is open to the whole community, featuring live music, utilizing modern media, and a spiritual atmosphere!

This is only the beginning, our church has decided to focus our Sunday morning worship on monthly themes this year, starting with a series that explains the identity of the church. There are a lot of misconceptions out there of who the church is, and what it does; so, starting in September, if you have ever wondered what the purpose of the church is, or ever wondered where it is supposed to fit in the culture, you are not only invited, but I encourage

you to come and find out! We will be following our series in September, which is called "This is Us", with a spooky October series about the many ghost stories found in the Bible, what God's word says about ghost's, and witches and everything that goes bump in the night! This year we will be covering several topics that are shrouded in mystery, from the function and purpose of Angels, to end-time prophecy, from spiritual gifts, to the seven churches of Revelation! In addition to that, every fifth Sunday this year I will be collecting questions asked by the congregation, and spending the entire church service answering those questions. Ever had a question about the Bible, or spiritual things, or life? The answers are out there, and you can come to the Methodist Church to find them, every fifth Sunday this year, the first one is in October!

Beyond our Sunday morning worship, we also offer a free online Facebook Bible study that is open to anyone who wants to attend. If the Sunday sermon didn't answer all your questions, or if you just want to dig deeper into the word, then check it out. All you have to do is "Like" our Facebook page, Cross and Flame Parish, and click the "Follow" button to receive notifications. I will be broadcasting live on that page every Saturday at 6:30 in the evening. This is an interactive Bible study, so you can type your questions or reactions in the comment section and I can react to them in real time! If you can't make the Saturday session, that's okay, I will post the video on the Facebook page, and you can participate anytime throughout the week! It's a convenient way to stay in the Word, no matter

where you are, or what your schedule looks like!

The Facebook page is also where we broadcast our Sunday morning worship service, and our Wednesday night contemporary service. That way if you are traveling, or can't make it to church you can always tune in on Facebook so you don't miss a thing! We always post church events, themes, and updates so it's a great way to stay connected!

Now finally, our church will be engaging in monthly "hands on" events throughout the year. We will be finding ways to get the kids out in the community, talking to people, praying for people, and making a difference in the town we live in. September's outreach will be a special prayer service, designed to be open to everyone in the community. All members of our church will be encouraged, to engage people, and seek out things that need to be prayed for. Don't be surprised if a member of our youth program, or our adult programs knocks on your door and asks if there is anything we can pray about. We will be constructing a prayer "mail box" so that you can stop by the church anytime, and fill out a prayer request card to be prayed over, culminating in the special prayer service held here at the church the last Sunday evening in September. Our calendar will be filled with events like this, where the people of the church will be reaching out and doing the work of the church, and the best part is, you're invited. We hope to see you this fall, and we hope to provide a place where we can all learn about God, receive His Spirit, and then go out into the community and make a difference!

Our season is beginning to wind down with only six more weeks until our final Market Day of the year. We are considering the Winter Wednesdays again, but the level of business received last year doesn't really make it a worthwhile effort. If we do decide to have it, then it will be in the front area of *The Sheridan Sentinel's* office. We'll let you know what we decide.

The day was sunny, bright, and beautiful with barely a breeze. My tent is broken, and Ronda hadn't brought hers, but we realized that it was going to get quite warm by noon so Ronda had her tent delivered and we shared its shade. Mike Matthews was glad for Ronda's tent as well, since each adjacent tent shaded the person just west of it because of the sun's angle at that time of the morning.

Cathy Broeckelman with "The Satisfiers!" pork products was on hand with meats, porkburger patties, chops, boneless sandwich ham, bacon, and more. She had quite a good day of business. One patron from Colorado, a return visitor who passes through Hoxie after purchasing

Rachel and Carol Farber with Jams, Jellies & More had a very large array of goods on their tables: jams, jellies, cinnamon rolls, pecan rolls, apple rolls, seedless watermelon, cantaloupe, sweet corn, a couple dozen farm-fresh eggs, a couple dozen farm fresh duck eggs, and homegrown fryers.

I had a nice spread of (huge!) zucchini, butternut

Good Things for the Table
A delicacy for luncheon or tea is small, round crisp crackers, covered with cottage cheese with a maraschino cherry in the middle. Cake may be used instead of the cracker, cutting it with a biscuit cutter.

Mock Chicken - Take two pounds of round steak, cut rather thin, a quarter of a pound of bacon and one onion. Cut steak into pieces about five inches long and three wide, salt and pepper and lay strips of the bacon lengthwise on the steak. Slice a little onion on top of the bacon, roll and skewer with toothpicks. Put butter or any sweet fat into a spider and brown the steak rolls in it, then add boiling water and simmer until tender. Make a gravy from the liquor in the frying pan.

Green Gage Sherbet - Take a quart of green gage plums, stew and put through a sieve, add the juice of two lemons, one and a half

cupfuls of sugar, and two tablespoonfuls of softened gelatin. Cook the sugar with half a cupful of water until a thick sirup is formed, add the other ingredients, chill, then freeze. Serve on plates bordered with green.

Honey Rolls - Dissolve a yeast cake in a cupful of warm milk, add a half cupful of butter or other fat, a tablespoonful of sugar and a teaspoonful of salt. Stir in a well beaten egg, add three cupfuls of flour. Knead and roll out about a half inch thick spread with raisins, chopped nuts and a cupful of strained honey. Let rise and bake in a moderate oven.

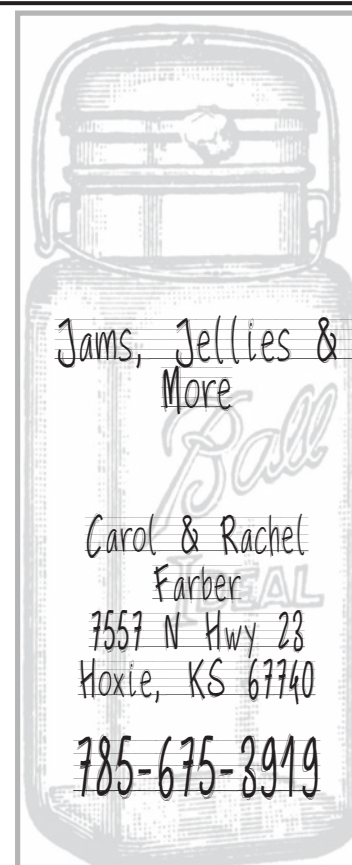
Seasonable Ideas
The spicing and preserving season has already begun, but be sure to add a few quarts of spiced blackberries.

Green Beans in Salt Brine - Take fresh beans, string and cut for table use, dry with a cloth and place on a layer of salt in a crock, cover with another layer of salt

and repeat until the crock is nearly full. Press with a potato masher until enough juice has been extracted to form a brine to cover the beans. Cover with a plate and weight to keep the beans under the brine. Cover the jar and keep in a cool place. They must be soaked before using.

Small berries like currants, black berries, blue berries and raspberries may all be satisfactorily dried by placing them on trays in the sun or drying them around the stove, or using both methods. The fruit should be dry enough to leave no stain when pinched between the fingers. Store in waxed bags or tight receptacles and keep in a dry, cool place.

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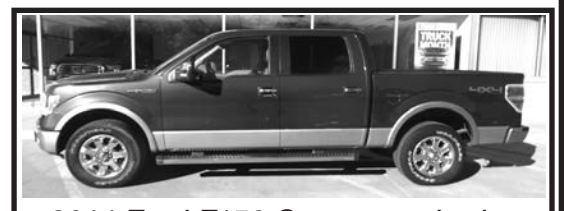

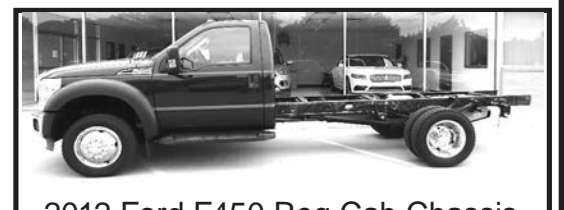

Farm News

Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending August 20, 2017, near normal temperatures were recorded across much of the State, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Most areas received one inch or less of rain, with localized rainfall measuring up to four inches in a few southeastern areas. There were 5.1 days suitable for fieldwork. Topsoil moisture rated 5 percent very short, 26 short, 66 adequate, and 3 surplus. Subsoil moisture rated 4 percent very short, 24 short, 70 adequate, and 2 surplus.

Field Crops Report: Corn condition rated 4 percent very poor, 10 poor, 29 fair, 43 good, and 14 excellent. Corn dough was 83 percent, near 86 last year and the five-year average of 85. Dented was 40 percent, behind 48 last year and 46 average.

Soybean condition rated 2 percent very poor, 8 poor, 35 fair, 49 good, and 6 excellent. Soybeans blooming was 95 percent, near 93 last year, and ahead of 90 average. Setting pods was 79 percent, ahead of 69 last year and 66 average.

Sorghum condition rated 1 percent very poor, 6 poor, 31 fair, 53 good, and 9 excellent. Sorghum headed was 79 percent, behind 89 last year, but near 77 average. Coloring was 11 percent, behind 30 last year and 20 average.

Cotton condition rated 3 percent very poor, 4 poor, 38 fair, 50 good, and 5 excellent.

Cotton squaring was 86 percent, near 88 last year, and behind 91 average. Setting bolls was 44 percent, near 48 last year, and behind 56 average. Bolls opening was 7 percent, ahead of 2 last year, and near 5 average.

Sunflower condition rated 0 percent very poor, 2 poor, 33 fair, 57 good, and 8 excellent. Sunflowers blooming was 70 percent, behind 80 last year, and near 72 average.

Alfalfa condition rated 2 percent very poor, 10 poor, 35 fair, 50 good, and 3 excellent. Alfalfa third cutting was 92 percent complete, near 90 last year, and ahead of 81 average. Fourth cutting was 24 percent, near 27 last year, but ahead of 17 average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 2 percent very poor, 9 poor, 33 fair, 50 good, and 6 excellent.

Stock water supplies rated 1 percent very short, 11 short, 87 adequate, and 1 surplus.

Kansas Milk Production

Milk production in Kansas during July 2017 totaled 284 million pounds, up 4 percent from July 2016, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. The average number of milk cows was 151,000 head, 6,000 head more than July 2016. Milk production per cow averaged 1,880 pounds.

West Nile Virus Confirmed in Kansas Horse

The Kansas Department of Agriculture Division of Animal Health (KDA-DAH) was notified in August by the Kansas State Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory that a horse in Reno County has tested positive for West Nile virus (WNV). The horse was euthanized due to the severity of the illness. This is the first reported equine case of WNV in Kansas in 2017. Horse owners are encouraged to vaccinate their horses to prevent the spread of WNV.

West Nile virus is the most common mosquito-borne disease in Kansas and in the United States. It causes severe neurological disease in horses. Birds and humans are also susceptible to the virus; other livestock and pet animals are not susceptible to WNV. Clinical signs in horses can include fever, incoordination, generalized weakness, drooping lips, teeth grinding and inability to rise. There is no specific treatment for WNV, but there are several effective vaccines available for use in horses.

Vaccines have proven to be a very effective prevention tool. Horses that have been vaccinated in past years will need an annual booster shot. Horse owners should also consult their private practicing veterinarian to determine an appropriate disease prevention plan for their horses.

In addition to vaccinations, horse owners also need to reduce the mosquito populations and their possible breeding areas. Crop Update

By August 13, three-quarters of the sorghum was at or beyond the heading stage, seven percentage points behind last year but slightly ahead of the five-year average. Nationally, 31 percent of the sorghum was at or beyond the coloring stage by week's end, nine percentage points behind last year and 7 points behind the five-year average. With major progress limited to Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas, 21 percent of the sorghum was mature by week's end—slightly behind last year and four percentage points behind the five-year average. Sorghum harvest continued in Texas with 51 percent complete, three percentage points ahead of the five-year average. Overall, 64 percent of the sorghum was reported in good to excellent condition, up three percentage points from last week but slightly lower than at the same time last year.

First Round of NAFTA Renegotiations Begin

Trade representatives from Canada, Mexico and the U.S. are in D.C. this week for the first round of renegotiating the North American Free Trade Agreement. The second round is scheduled for early September in Mexico. The countries are hoping to wrap up talks by early next year. Key issues negotiators will be discussing include rules of origin, dispute resolution, supply management and government procurement.

On Wednesday, the largest agricultural organizations in the U.S., Canada and Mexico sent a joint letter to the countries' chief negotiators. "Agriculture in each NAFTA country would suffer greatly from disruptions to the trading relationships that have developed over the last 23 years," the letter said. The letter continued, "Discussions to increase agricultural trade volumes should include the following:

1. Seeking increase and improved regulatory alignment
 2. Improving the flow of goods at border crossings
 3. Further alignment of sanitary and phytosanitary measures
 4. Elimination of technical barriers to trade
 5. Adapting the agreement to technological advances since the implementation, such as digital trade, etc."

CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 35

A CHARTER ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HOXIE, KANSAS, EXEMPTING THE CITY FROM THE PROVISIONS OF K.S.A. 12-621 RELATING TO SEWAGE DISPOSAL WORKS IMPROVEMENTS AND THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS THEREFOR AND PROVIDING SUBSTITUTE AND ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS RELATING THERETO.

WHEREAS, Article 12, Section 5 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas (the "Act") provides that cities may exercise certain home rule powers, including passing charter ordinances which exempt such cities from the acts of the Kansas Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the City of Hoxie, Kansas (the "City") is a city, as defined in the Act, duly created and organized, under the laws of the State of Kansas; and

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 12-621 is part of an enactment of the Kansas Legislature relating to sewage disposal works improvements and the issuance of bonds for such purposes, which enactment is applicable to the City, but is not uniformly applicable to all cities within the State of Kansas; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City desires, by charter ordinance, to exempt the City from the provisions of K.S.A. 12-621, and to provide substitute and additional provisions therefor.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HOXIE, KANSAS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. **Exemption-K.S.A. 12-621.** The City, by the power vested in it by the Act, hereby elects to exempt itself from and make inapplicable to it, the provisions of K.S.A. 12-621 and does hereby provide the following substitute and additional provisions in place thereof:

The governing body of the City may operate and maintain sewers and disposal works for the collection and purification of the sewage of the City, or of any part thereof, including joint operation and maintenance of such facilities through interlocal cooperation with another city or cities. The costs and expenses of building the same, in whole or in part, may be borne by the City as a whole, and may be paid out of the general revenue fund; or if the governing body determines, general obligation bonds of the City may be issued for such purpose.

Section 2. **Severability.** If any provision or section of this Charter Ordinance is deemed or ruled unconstitutional or otherwise illegal or invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provision of this Charter Ordinance. In such instance, this Charter Ordinance shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision had not been contained herein.

Section 3. **Effective Date.** This Charter Ordinance shall be published once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks in the official City newspaper, and shall take effect sixty (60) days after final publication, unless a petition signed by a number of electors of the City equal to not less than ten percent (10%) of the number of electors who voted at the last preceding regular City election shall be filed in the office of the City Clerk, demanding that this Charter Ordinance be submitted to a vote of the electors, in which event this Charter Ordinance shall take effect when approved by a majority of the electors voting at an election held for such purpose.

PASSED with more than a 2/3 vote of the Governing Body of the City of Hoxie, Kansas, this 14th day of August, 2017, and APPROVED and SIGNED by the Mayor.






