TAXPAYERS' REPORT

The Selden bypass road is complete, and it is beautiful! Leroy did a beautiful job on this road and we can all be proud of us all working together to get things done.

We are getting close to formulating the 2020 Budget. I think it is wise to look at the preceding years to get a better focus of where we are in the taxing process. The two schedules below show County Valuations for Sheridan County and surrounding counties, as well as the mill levies for the last several

County valuations have increased significantly in the past 10 years and the mill levy imposed upon the taxpayers have also increased significantly. This is why your property taxes have nearly doubled in that time. When the valuation goes up the mill levy needs to go down to maintain the same amount of tax dollars collected. This has not been the case. Valuations have been going up and the mill levy has also been going up. This situation results in an *automatic tax increase year after year*.

All the counties in Western Kansas are having trouble attracting businesses and residents because the tax amount is unaffordable. Sheridan County is the bright spot in all the counties because we are the only school district that has a significant increase in school enrollment. We also have many very well-run businesses and an outstanding hospital. All the things that make a community great and prosperous will not continue with high property taxes.

We, here in Sheridan County, need to continue to be the best county in Western Kansas. For Sheridan County to continue to prosper, we absolutely have to get a handle on the property tax rate we are imposing on the residents, businesses, and farmers. With farm commodity prices at a very low level we are obligated to reduce taxes and help all we can. Yes, we need County services, and I'm not suggesting that we reduce any of these. I am saying that we have zero population growth which does not suggest that we need to spend more money and expand county services. We have a large cash carryover from 2018 that we need to reduce to have adequate reserves, but not more than that. We all need to work together to help each other. That is how a community and county will succeed

and grow and prosper.

Sheriff's Office K9 Dak To Receive Body Armor



Sheridan County Sheriff's Office K9 Dak will receive a bullet and stab protective vest thanks to a charitable donation from non-profit organization Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. K9 Dak's vest is sponsored by Katrina Owens of Cockeysville, MD and will be embroidered with the sentiment "In memory of Heidi Owens". Delivery is expected within eight to ten weeks.

Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. is a 501c (3) charity located in East Taunton, MA whose mission is to provide bullet and stab protective vests and other assistance to dogs of law enforcement and related agencies throughout the United States. The non-profit was established in 2009 to assist law enforcement agencies with this potentially lifesaving body armor for their four-legged K9 officers. Since its inception, Vested Interest in K9s, Inc. provided over 3,400 protective vests, in 50 states, through private and corporate donations, at a value of \$5.7 million dollars.

The program is open to dogs actively employed in the U.S. with law enforcement or related agencies who are certified and at least 20 months of age. New K9 graduates, as well as K9s with expired vests, are eligible to participate.

The donation to provide one protective vest for a law enforcement K9 is \$950.00. Each vest has a value between \$1,744 - \$2,283 and a five-year warranty, and an average weight of 4-5 lbs. Do you want to make a difference in Sheridan County? Do you enjoy volunteering? Do you have ideas for positive change and improvement to our communities? Then make plans now to participate in the 2019-2020 Strategic Doing Sheridan County initiative!

The Sheridan County Community Foundation (SCCF) is pleased to bring in facilitator, Betty Johnson of Betty Johnson & Associates to lead residents through the "Strategic Doing" process designed to help communities and organizations create action-plans with measurable outcomes and accountability. The process helps guide complex conversations and provides a pathway to results

by linking and leveraging community assets/resources, stay on track, follow up and successfully complete projects, overcome challenges and make positive changes!

The Tuesday, June 18 meeting, scheduled for 7 to 9:15 p.m. at the Hoxie Elks Lodge, will serve as a "kick-off" meeting where special guest, Nadine Sigle, with the K-State Research and Extension Office, will present the "First Impressions" survey findings. This survey was conducted back in 2018 when a handful of Victoria, Kansas residents came to Hoxie unannounced and recorded their "first impressions"/observations of the community. In turn, Hoxie sent several residents to survey

Victoria as well. The survey report contains a tremendous amount of information which can be used to determine potential projects in the Hoxie

The evening will also include an overview of past Strategic Doing projects, as well as suggested projects for 2019. Participants will have the opportunity to suggest additional projects before breaking into groups and officially walking through the general Strategic Doing process. Groups will be tasked with determining their project's assets, recruiting more members and preparing for an in-depth Strategic Doing session at the July 24 meeting. Following the August 6

meeting, a bi-monthly meeting schedule will commence where groups will be asked to report on their projects. New projects/groups will be added as prior projects are completed. These meetings may also offer specific organizations an opportunity to work one-on-one with Johnson in individual projects as well.

AG Derek Schmidt: Second Amendment Rights Extend Outside the Home

The constitutional right to keep and bear arms extends outside a person's home, Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt this week told the U.S. Supreme Court.

At issue in the case is a New York City law that prohibits an individual who has obtained a license to own a firearm in their home from transporting that firearm anywhere, even if locked and unloaded, except to one of the shooting ranges located within city limits. Under the ordinance, it is illegal for a New York resident to transport a firearm to a shooting range in a nearby state.

In the legal brief filed this week, Schmidt along with 21 other state attorneys general and the governors of Kentucky and Mississippi, asked the U.S. Supreme Court to reverse a ruling by the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals upholding the city

ordinance. The attorneys general argue the ordinance unconstitutionally restricts the right to use a firearm for self-defense and defense of family outside of the home, restricts the right to travel and discriminates against interstate commerce.

"If New York's regulatory scheme is allowed to stand and is copied by cities around the United States, it would undercut the ability of individuals to travel with their individual rights intact and also threaten state economies dependent upon tourism dollars," the attornevs general wrote.

The case is New York State Rifle & Pistol Association Inc. v. City of New York, New York, No. 18-280. A copy of the states' brief is available at http://bit.ly/2Qem0qR. The Supreme Court is expected to hear oral argument on the case in the fall.

U.S. Beef Gains Full Access to Japan

Today, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced the United States and Japan have agreed on new terms and conditions eliminate Japan's longstanding restrictions on U.S. beef exports, paving the way for expanded sales to the United States' top global beef market. Last week, Secretary Perdue met with Japanese government officials and affirmed the importance of science-based trade rules. The new terms will take effect immediately and allow U.S. products from all cattle to enter Japan for the first time since 2003. Today's announcement will hopefully place a path forward for other markets around the globe to accept science-based policies.

Kansas Honey Production

Honey production in 2018 from Kansas producers with five or more colonies totaled 365,000 pounds, down 34 percent from 2017, according to the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service.

There were 5,000 honey producing colonies in Kansas during 2018, down 29 percent from 2017.

Average yield was 73 pounds per colony, down 6 pounds from 2017. Producer stocks were 95,000 pounds on December 15, 2018 down from 260,000 pounds a year earlier.

Prices for the 2018 crop averaged 300 cents per pound, down from 403 cents in 2017. Prices were based on retail sales by producers and sales to private processors and cooperatives. Total value of honey produced in 2018 was \$1.10 million, down 51 percent from 2017.





the last several Over weeks, important roles and responsibilities of the Board of Education have been highlighted, courtesy of the Kanas Association of School Boards. The eighth and final role to be addressed is ADVOCACY.

ADVOCACY

School boards serve as the leading advocate on behalf of students and their schools in the community. Both individually and collectively, school board members need to remain informed of issues at the local, state and national levels. In a time when children come to school with more challenges than ever before, schools acknowledge they cannot meet all these needs alone. Instead, they collaborate families, community organizations and other public and private agencies to benefit both the children and the community they serve.

As a result, the advocacy role is increasingly important for school board members. Informing

citizens about the schools' accomplishments, challenges and needs is an essential part of school board leadership. Through their actions, board members represent the community and help foster understanding and support for the schools.

Specific responsibilities for school boards include:

- Seeking others who can help expand educational opportunities to meet the needs of the whole child;
- Advocating for children and families and establishing strong relationships with parents and other mentors to help support
- Promoting the schools' instructional and other programs; Leading in celebrating the achievements of students and others in education; and
- Promoting school board service as a meaningful way to make long-term contributions to

These responsibilities mean school boards cannot work in isolation. They must bring together the entire community (parents, community groups and others concerned about education) in effective and responsible ways to initiate and sustain lasting school improvement.

The spur was discussed again with a suggestion of a stop sign or 'pavement ends' sign when you go west to east. Carder has received complaints about the east end of the red line. It was not finished last year and now is a swamp. This is for approximately 4-5 miles.

Barry Quanz, Noxious Weed employee, will be back at work tomorrow and Carder will talk with him about some areas that need sprayed.

Carder advised the Board a motorgrader had been moved to south of Menlo. The employee in that area will go from home straight to the machine. If he is unable to blade on a certain day, he will drive into the shop and do shop work.

There is a program on the CAT motorgrader that locates where the machine is and where it has been working. John Deere has the same option. Carder is finding out about the cost.

John Kruse asked if the road crew can set up a route, so they don't dead head so much.

Ross said that a Foley representative was going to come and do training on the equipment and there will also be videos to watch.

Leroy Spresser, Spresser Excavation, entered meeting. Spresser was not happy with Commissioner Dewey's comments at the prior week's meeting as they pertained to the road he was working on north of Hoxie. Spresser felt that Dewey should have come to him directly instead of making the comment during the meeting. Dewey stated he thinks Spresser is doing an outstanding job and apologized for the misunderstanding. Spresser said the County has good guys working there, don't cut them short. They can do the job, support them. Spresser exited

the meeting. The Board stated that if someone comes to a Board

member, they should be sent to Carder to discuss the problem. Wes Bainter stated that Wade Zodrow wants to be considered for County road work. Wes Bainter asks that Carder talk with Spresser about work on the red line. Joe Bainter commented he hopes the spur east of Selden can be done before harvest. Spresser will be contacted about this road as

Jonathan Herald from the Western Prairie Child Advocacy Center entered the meeting. Herald gave a report of what the group does. Herald stated they receive about 70% of their funding from grants. In 2018, there were 12 cases in Sheridan County that were helped. The County normally budgets \$2,500 for this group. Herald stated it costs approximately \$1,700/case. Wes Bainter asked to see the balance sheet and Herald will send it to him. Copies of the Interagency Agreement between Child Western Prairie Advocacy, law enforcement and the County Attorney were distributed to the Board. The Pledge Form for 2020 was given to Bracht to be discussed when the Board begins work on the 2020 budget.
At 10:13, the Board took a

5-minute break.

At 10:17, Wes Bainter made a motion to enter in to executive session for a period of 2 minutes for the discussion of non-elected personnel. Dewey seconded the motion. Carried 3-0. Present were the Board, Pratt and Bracht. The door opened at 10:19 with no decision being made. Nicholas Roudybush, shop

mechanic and David Bingham, Landfill Operator entered the meeting. Roudybush had received an estimate to repair the BoMag from Berry Tractor. The cost was \$225,000. Wes Bainter commented he would like to have seen an itemized repair bill, not just a lump sum. Roudybush reminded the Board that CAT would only give \$10,000 trade-in on the BoMag if we were to purchase from them. Wes Bainter said that he will get other bids for repairs on this machine. Roudybush reminded him that the machine seems hard to get parts for. Bingham stated that on average he puts about 400 hours a year on the equipment. Wes Bainter stated he is not opposed to spending money on necessary items but feels there is a lot of unnecessary spending going on. Roudybush reiterated that they have tried to cut back in the Road & Bridge Department and that repairs can't be done halfway.

Carder came to the table and advised the Board that all the fencing material has been ordered for the road that Spresser Excavation just completed.

At 10:43, Carder asked for an executive session. Dewey made a motion, seconded by Wes Bainter, to enter in to executive session for a period of 5 minutes for the discussion of non-elected matters, personnel issues. Carried 3-0. Present were the Board, Pratt, Carder and Bracht. The door opened at 10:50 with no decision being made.

Carder will talk with Leroy Spresser about coming up with a bid for completion of the red line. Carder was reminded to get the information to Bracht so it can be distributed to the entire Board to be reviewed. Carder advised the Board that most of the Road & Bridge radios just need new batteries so those have been ordered.
