Celebrating 100 Years



Over this memorial weekend, Schieferecke relatives gathered to honor and remember the military personnel who perished while serving in the United States Armed Forces. Schieferecke relatives also remembered and honored their patriarch and grandfather, William Schieferecke, who started this family farm 100 years ago. Since then, this land has always remained with his direct descendants.

Over a hill just east of Leoville, Kansas, on 24 October 1890, Joe Dempewolf homesteaded 160 acres where he built a house, a barn, and various sheds. On 13 October 1898, Dempewolf purchased an adjoining 160 acres from homesteaders, Henry and Eva Bieker. These two quarter sections were purchased from Dempewolf by William Schieferecke on 13 March 1919.

Faith, family, and farming were important aspects underpinning William Schieferecke's decisions. Twice a widower along with his son John and two minor children, Rose and Bernard, William worked hard to keep the family together and

thriving. During a return visit to Germany to see his mother, William told relatives there that his fortune in America was in his hands and he showed them the calluses caused by all the physical work he did, much of it with horses. William believed in the promise and opportunity of America and quickly learned English as a second language. His knowledge of English and his handwriting were exceptional. Though strong in many ways, William was unable to overcome the ravages of flu/pneumonia and died 16 February 1921.

His son John inherited and worked the farm until 30 September 1930, when he turned the farm over to his brother Bernard. Earlier, at the age of 18, Bernard signed up to serve four years with the Marine Corp and was sworn in on 28 November 1923. Bernard was transferred aboard the California and was assigned as captain of a gun crew. He had many adventures sailing along the western coast, Washington to California, to Australia, through the Panama Canal,

Youth Livestock Judging Clinic in Hoxie

Have you ever attended a livestock show and wondered to yourself why you were placed a certain way in your class? Or maybe you wondered what exactly the judge was trying to say about your animal. Livestock selection and oral reason presentation are skills that require a lot of fine tuning. Many aspects go into youth livestock judging, and many benefits can stem from involvement in this extra-curricular activity. Youth gain the ability to analyze a group of animals and establish a correct order of placement, compare livestock to ideal standards for that particular species, increase communication skills, and learn how to value teamwork - just to name a few!

If the idea of developing or honing these skills appeals to your children, mark your calendars now to attend K-State Research and Extension - Twin Creek District's youth Livestock Judging Clinic. This event is to be held at the Sheridan County Fairgrounds in Hoxie, KS on Saturday, June 15th. Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. with the clinic extending from 9:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

This clinic will cover a variety of topics including livestock selection (cattle, swine, sheep and goats), oral reason development and presentation, and an opportunity to test new knowledge during a mock contest and reason critique. A pulled pork meal will be sponsored by Equity Bank of Hoxie. Registration is open to any youth ages 7-18 years old, and to youth in any county. There is no registration fee for this clinic. Registration is due to your local Twin Creeks Extension Office (offices located in Decatur, Graham, Norton and Sheridan Counties) or by email to jenileem@ksu.edu.

Good Things for the Home Table

The value of wholesome food well prepared and well seasoned, cannot be overestimated.

Veronique Soup - Add one cupful of stewed and strained tomatoes, to which is added one-eighth teaspoonful of soda, to three cupfuls of veal broth. Thicken with one and one-half tablespoonfuls each of butter and flour cooked together; then add one and one-half teaspoonfuls of salt, a dash of cayenne, one-half cupful of cooked rice, one and one-half pimentos cut in strips, and one-fourth cupful of heavy cream.

Rhubarb Tapioca Pudding - Soak two-thirds cupful of pearl tapioca over night in cold water to cover. Drain,

put in a double boiler, add one and one-fourth cupfuls of boiling water and two-thirds teaspoonful of salt; cook until the tapioca has absorbed the water. Peel rhubarb and cut in one-fourth inch pieces - there should be three cupfuls; then sprinkle with one-third cupful of sugar. Add to the tapioca and cook until the tapioca is transparent and rhubarb soft. Turn into a serving dish and accompany with sugar and thin cream.

Meat Loaf - Chop one pound of veal and two pounds of beef. Mix and add one cupful loaf bread crumbs, one cupful of milk, one teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth teaspoonful of pepper and three eggs slightly beaten. Shape in loaf, put in pan and lay across the top six slices of fat salt pork. Roast one and one-half hours, basting every ten minutes at first with one-half cupful of hot water and the fat in the pan. Remove to a hot platter, pour around a tomato or brown sauce and garnish with parsley.

Stuffed Figs - Mash cream cheese, moisten with heavy cream and season highly with salt and cayenne; make into balls three-fourths inch in diameter. Wash and dry figs, make an incision in each and stuff with the cheese balls. Arrange in piles on a late covered with a lace paper doily.

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



**Commission Minutes
5/22/2019**

Now on this 22nd day of May 2019, the Board of Commissioners, Sheridan County, Kansas met in regular session with Chairman Joe Bainter presiding. Others present were Wes Bainter, Troy Dewey and County Clerk Heather Bracht. Guests were Rachel Farber, Agnes Winter, Doyle Kauk, Mike Beckman and Tom Beckman. Joe Bainter called the meeting to order.

County Attorney Joe Pratt entered the meeting. Pratt presented a contract for Appellate Service with the Office of the Attorney General. There is a \$2,000 fee for this service. Dewey made a motion seconded by Joe Bainter to approve and sign the contract. Carried 3-0.

Wes Bainter spoke briefly about the Western Kansas Child Advocacy Center. He would like to see them work more closely with High Plains Mental Health/other agencies.

Pratt has information on who to contact for the pipeline and will get with Carder for clarification on the road that has the damage.

Tom Beckman presented pictures of the land around his house with the musk thistle problems to Pratt. They are on the list with Stevenson to be sprayed.

Ross Carder, Road & Bridge Supervisor, entered the meeting. Carder distributed a new policy handbook for Road & Bridge employees which he would like the Commissioners to review and approve before distribution to the employees.

Carder stated that Spreser Excavation had completed the spur east of Selden. The road department put up a stop sign and speed limit sign and also put sand on it.

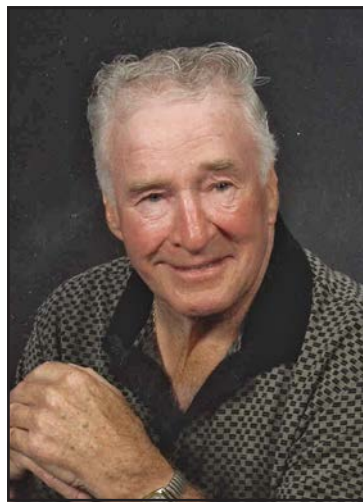
Carder spoke with the individual putting the fence up on 110N and hopefully it will be done this week on the south side.

Vic Winter looked at the BoMag and wasn't as hard on the machine as Berry Tractor had been. Winter gave a quote of \$4,000-\$5,000 to re-hose the machine and just run it. Dewey made a motion to allow Winter to re-hose the BoMag, seconded by Wes Bainter. Carried 3-0.

Carder received a bid for blades from CAT, but they are more expensive than the Welborn Sales bid for blades. Dewey made a motion, seconded by Joe Bainter to approve purchasing 540 blades for a total cost of \$36,493.00 from Welborn Sales. Carried 3-0.

Employees are doing some clean-up work at the recycling building and the shop. A shipment of cardboard went out last week. Carder will look at prices for the machine that can wrap the bales of aluminum. The state inspected the landfill and

At 9:25, Wes Bainter made a motion, seconded by Dewey, to enter in to executive session for a period of 15 minutes. Motion carried 3-0. Present were the Board, Pratt and Carder. The door opened at 9:40.

Wes Bainter made a motion that the landfill and personnel be placed under the jurisdiction of the road & bridge supervisor. Dewey seconded the motion. Carried 3-0.

John Deere sent a representative from Murphy to go over the tracking system in some of the John Deere equipment currently being used. It will track engine oil, water, idling, when it is turned on, etc. Carder is getting a bid for the 5 that currently do not have this feature. Carder would like to put this on the tractors as well.

Joe Bainter made a motion to approve the May 15, 2019 minutes as presented as well as the May 17, 2019 payroll. Dewey seconded the motion. Carried 3-0.

A bid was received from Erwin Construction to repair water damage to the Appraiser's office and the courtroom. The project was tabled as Wes Bainter stated he will make some phone calls.

Wes Bainter made a motion to give Hoxie Recreation an additional \$5,000 and Selden Recreation an additional \$1,000, seconded by Joe Bainter. Carried 3-0. The amount budgeted for 2019 was \$5,000 for Hoxie Recreation, bringing the total to \$10,000 and \$2,000 for Selden Recreation bringing their total to \$3,000.

Don Koerperich, Sheridan County Emergency Manager, entered the meeting. Koerperich was there to give an update on what he has been doing as Emergency Manager. Koerperich has attended several Homeland Security meetings. Sheridan County is still on the list to receive the Message Boards but to-date they have not yet been received. Training will be involved once he has them.

A new printer for the ID cards should be here later in the year. Cards will be

printed for all equipment and vehicles so that in case of mutual aid with another county, Sheridan County equipment and vehicles can be accounted for.

Koerperich has attended several tabletop exercises including recovery in an emergency and an active shooter scenario. Koerperich plans on discussing with Sheriff Carver the possibility of having an active shooter tabletop with the school and hospital.

There are currently about 500 Sheridan County residents using the Code Red alert system. The hospital has asked to have access so they are able to reach employees in an emergency, etc. The Board and Koerperich have no problem with this. The Sheridan County Emergency Plan expires this year. Koerperich has submitted a new plan to the State, it has been returned with a few changes, so once everything is in order, Koerperich will return for the Commissioners to sign. A weather station has been received from Homeland Security. This unit will be placed on the roof of the Courthouse and the wireless monitor will go to dispatch in the Sheriff's Office so they have access to it. It will show rain, wind speed/direction, temperature, etc. By consensus, the Board thought this was a good plan and signed the necessary paperwork. Koerperich stated that some counties are placing a weather station at the lake. The next Homeland Security meeting will be held June 10 and there is an LEPC meeting next week. Koerperich exited the meeting.
