Celebrating 100 Years



Over this memorial weekend, Schieferecke relatives gathered to honor and remember the military personnel who perished while serving in the United States Armed Forces. Schieferecke relatives also remembered and honored their patriarch and grandfather, William Schieferecke, who started this family farm 100 years ago. Since then, this land has always remained with his direct descendants.

Over a hill just east of Leoville, Kansas, on 24 October 1890, Joe Dempewolf homesteaded 160 acres where he built a house, a barn, and various sheds. On 13 October 1898, Dempewolf purchased an adjoining 160 acres from homesteaders, Henry and Eva Bieker. These two quarter sections were purchased from Dempewolf by William Schieferecke on 13 March 1919

Faith, family, and farming were important aspects underpinning William Schieferecke's decisions. Twice a widower along with his son John and two minor children, Rose and Bernard, William worked hard to keep the family together and

thriving. During a return visit to Germany to see his mother, William told relatives there that his fortune in America was in his hands and he showed them the calluses caused by all the physical work he did, much of it with horses. William believed in the promise and opportunity of America and quickly learned English as a second language. His knowledge of English and his handwriting were exceptional. Though strong in many ways, William was unable to overcome the ravages of flu/pneumonia and died 16 February 1921.

His son John inherited and worked the farm until 30 September 1930, when he turned the farm over to his brother Bernard. Earlier, at the age of 18, Bernard signed up to serve four years with the Marine Corp and was sworn in on 28 November 1923. Bernard was transferred aboard the California and was assigned as captain of a gun crew. He had many adventures sailing along the western coast, Washington to California, to Australia, through the Panama Canal,



Have you ever attended a livestock show and wondered to yourself why you were placed a certain way in your class? Or maybe you wondered what exactly the judge was trying to say about your animal. Livestock selection and oral reason presentation are skills

that require a lot of fine tuning.

Many aspects go into youth livestock judging, and many benefits can stem from involvement in this extracurricular activity. Youth gain the ability to analyze a group of animals and establish a correct order of placement, compare livestock to ideal standards for that particular species, increase communication skills, and learn how to value teamwork - just to name a few!

If the idea of developing or honing these skills appeals to your children, mark your calendars now to attend K-State Research and Extension - Twin Creek District's youth Livestock Judging Clinic. This event is to be held at the Sheridan County Fairgrounds in Hoxie, KS on Saturday, June 15th. Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. with the clinic extending from 9:00 a.m. –

3:30 p.m. This clinic will cover a variety of topics including livestock selection (cattle, swine, sheep and goats), oral reason development and presentation, and an opportunity to test new knowledge during a mock contest and reason critique. A pulled pork meal will be sponsored by Equity Bank of Hoxie. Registration is open to any youth ages 7-18 years old, and to youth in any county. There is no registration fee for this clinic. 





Topsoil moisture supplies rated 0 percent very short, 1 short, 61 adequate, and 38 surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 0 percent very short, 1 short, 63 adequate, and 36 surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat condition rated 3 percent very poor, 10 poor, 30 fair, 47 good, and 10 excellent. Winter wheat headed was 95 percent, equal to last year, and near 97 for the five-year average. Coloring was 16 percent, well behind 43 last year and 48 average.

Corn condition rated 3 percent very poor, 14 poor, 40 fair, 39 good, and 4 excellent. Corn planted was 79 percent, behind 96 last year and 93 average. Emerged was 60 percent, well behind 89 last year and 81 average.

Soybeans planted was 26 percent, well behind 77 last year and 53 average. Emerged was 16 percent, well behind 58 last year and 36 average.

Sorghum planted was 8 percent, well behind 34 last year, and behind 26 average.

Cotton condition rated 8 percent very poor, 8 poor, 53 fair, 29 good, and 2 excellent. Cotton planted was 48 percent, well behind 75 last year, and near 49 average.

Sunflowers planted was 17 percent, behind 33 last year, and near 19 average.

Pasture and Range Report: Pasture and range conditions rated 1 percent very poor, 3 poor, 25 fair, 55 good, and 16 excellent.

Bernard and Clara survived the dust bowl years when pastures dried up and cattle were given thistles to eat. Grasshoppers consumed anything edible even the wooden handles on tools. Damp towels were placed over the babies' cribs to keep out the dust. To supplement farm income, Bernard worked on highway 83 to Oberlin and was head of a crew building many of the bridges. Bernard also farmed with horses until purchasing his first small tractor. Bernard and Clara's family survived the extraordinary challenges of the dust bowl days which brought plunging farm incomes, and the collapse of the banking system. Yet, holding hands together, Bernard and Clara's family survived these hard times and thrived.

Over the years, all of Bernard and Clara's sons served their country: Bill (Army), John (Marines), George (Navy), Jim (Army), and Paul (Army). Grandson William Radnor served in the Marines. Three greatgrandsons served: Carl (Air Force), Joe (Merchant Marines) and Nathan (Navy). We salute them for their sacrifice and service.

Carder stated that Spresser Excavation had completed the spur east of Selden. The road department put up a stop sign and speed limit sign and also put sand on it.


Carder spoke with the individual putting the fence up on 110N and hopefully it will be done this week on the south side.
