Admission is only \$5 for ages 13 and up, \$2 for ages 6-12, and free for kids ages 5 and under.

"There's really something for everyone at the Market," commented Prairie Museum Director Ann Miner. "The kids can enjoy games, pony rides, and a petting zoo, while the guys will enjoy the Rusty Truck and Tractor Show. There will be food vendors and of course full museum access is included in the admission fees.'

Prairie Barn Market is the brainchild of Shanda Mattix, owner of Barnwood and Bling. "I had been a vendor at a lot of 'junktique' fairs in the past and most of these were some distance from home. I was sure that northwest Kansas would welcome this type of event. and the Prairie Museum grounds provided the perfect location." Mattix says she envisioned a fun, family-friendly event and has been very pleased with how this has come to pass.

Prairie Barn Market is one of three events going on in Colby on June 4, adding to the incentives to spend the day there. Pickin' on the Plains, the annual Bluegrass Festival held at the Thomas County Fairgrounds, will have performances, and workshops all day. The Highway 24 Garage Sale is also on the docket for the day.





threw their best. Despite their efforts they did not place.

Tori Bainter, preliminaries for the 100m Hurdles. Tori placed 7th in her heat with a time of 18.29, and 14th overall. Tori did not make it to finals.

The girls 4x100m preliminaries. The team consisted of Emily Bainter, Sofie Gourley, Hayley Jacobs, and Grayce Schieferecke. Crossing the finish line with a time of 53.87 in 13<sup>th</sup> place, they did not qualify for finals.

Ryan Shaw, 400m preliminaries. Knowing that he was ranked high in the state already, the pressure was on. After a tough kick on the track, Ryan took 1st in his heat and advanced to finals. It was now time for Girls Javelin, Kinley Rogers and Emily Bainter. Similar to the boys' event the competition was hard and both throwers came short of placing.

4x400m preliminaries. The team was made up of Drew Bretz, Isaac Dierks, Cade Gourley, and Ryan Shaw. They decided that this was their race and ran a 3:33.96 placing them 2<sup>nd</sup> in their heat and third overall in prelims, advancing the relay to finals.

After a good night's rest, Saturday's finals began.

Emily Bainter was up for her high jump. Starting height was 4'8" which Emily was able to clear on her second attempt. However, she failed in clearing 5'0" ending her jumping for the day and placing her at 13th place overall.

The girls 4x800m relay, composed of Hayley Jacobs, Izzie Baier, Sofie Gourley, and Macie Wente, was now up. Running a 10:51.01, the team finished 8th place earning their spot on the podium.

The boys 4x800m relay, composed of Drew Bretz, Connor Dierks, Kane Epp, and Duncan Bell, ran an 8:49.05. It is notable that this marks an almost 10 second PR for this group. Despite their efforts the team placed 9th, one spot away from making the

Tucker Baalman was up with his 100m wheelchair dash. Putting forward his best effort and with a close race, Tucker finished third with a time of 17.59 making his way onto the podium this year.

For the 1600m race, the team had Drew Bretz running. Drew placed 3<sup>rd</sup> with a time of 4:42.53, and also earned his spot on the podium.

The 4 x 800m relay team of Emma Weiner, Sidney Taylor, Rayna Taylor, and Anette Hernandez ran their best time of the year on Saturday morning. They ran a 10:47.85 for sixth place. Freshman Anette Hernandez also ran the 1600m at 6:06.04 for eighth place.

Senior Ethan Weiner finished his track career at Golden Plains with a 12th place finish at state with an 11:20.41 3200m run. He holds the school record of 10:37.96 set at state his junior year.

The Lady Bulldogs scored 30 points as a team placing them sixth overall in the state out of 50 teams. "It was a very successful weekend overall," said Coach Travis Smith. "I am so proud of this team and their performance all year long."



#### Kansas Crop Progress and Condition

For the week ending May 29, 2022, there were 3.3 days suitable for fieldwork, according the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Topsoil moisture supplies rated 18% very short, 19% short, 51% adequate, and 12% surplus. Subsoil moisture supplies rated 22% very short, 24% short, 48% adequate, and 6% surplus.

Field Crops Report: Winter wheat condition rated 16% very poor, 23% poor, 33% fair, 25% good, and 3% excellent. Winter wheat headed was 95%, near 93% last year and 92% for the five-year average. Coloring was 31%, ahead of 12% last year and 21% average.

Corn planted was 87%, ahead of 82% last year, and near 85% average. Emerged was 61%, near 65% last year, and behind 68% average.

Soybeans planted was 56%, near 57% last year, but ahead of 50% average. Emerged was 35%, near 38% last year and 33% average.

Sorghum planted was 20%, near 16% last year and 17% average.

Cotton condition rated 2% very poor, 6% poor, 37% fair, 54% good, and 1% excellent. Cotton planted was 84%, well ahead of 62% last year and 53% average.

Sunflowers planted was 12%, behind 25% last year and 19% average.

#### Northern Plains Farm Labor

In the Northern Plains Region (Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota, and South Dakota) there were 33,000 workers hired directly by farm operators on farms and ranches during the week of April 10-16, 2022, down 6% from the April 2021 reference week, according to USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service. Workers numbered 27,000 during the week of January 09-15, 2022, unchanged from the January 2021 reference week.

Farm operators paid their hired workers an average wage of \$17.63 per hour during the April 2022 reference week, up 7% from the April 2021 reference week. Field workers received an average of \$17.43 per hour, up \$0.88. Livestock workers earned \$16.56 per hour, up \$1.16 from a year earlier. The field and livestock worker combined wage rate, at \$16.94, was up \$0.99 from the April 2021 reference week. Hired laborers worked an average of 43.7 hours during the April 2022 reference week, compared with 43.0 hours worked during the April 2021 reference week.

Farm operators in the Northern Plains Region paid their hired workers an average wage of \$17.99 per hour during the January 2022 reference week, up 8% from the January 2021 reference week. Field workers received an average of \$17.45 per hour, up \$0.51. Livestock workers earned \$16.56 per hour, up \$1.42 from a year earlier. The field and livestock worker combined wage rate, at \$16.89, was up \$1.04 from the January 2021 reference week.
